

Introduction to Breaking the Silence

The sexual abuse scandals that have arisen in various parts of Christ's Church in recent years are a reminder to all of us that appropriate safeguards must be put in place when we are working with children. For the sake of the gospel and God's holy name, we must ensure that we make every effort to prevent abuse within the Church, to help those who are hurting, and know how to offer the gospel to those who offend. Breaking the Silence is a document that has been adopted by the PCV Assembly. It must be followed by all organisations at local, presbytery and state levels within our Church. It sets in place basic precautions which should be taken in all youth and children's ministry, as well as a procedure to deal with allegations of misconduct. Introduction to Breaking the Silence is a one hour seminar which is intended to outline the general requirement of the document as well as providing examples of its use in camps, youth groups and Sunday Schools.

Post—What?

Our ultimate model of ministry is Jesus himself: "The Son of man did not come to be served but to serve." Yet it is in our nature that none of us particularly likes serving others. Maybe we are more happy to do it when everyone is watching, or when we will get the slap on the back afterwards. But so often participating in ministry is not glamorous. So often it is the leader who (begrudgingly) is left with a mountain of dishes to do while everyone else is off playing warball. So I guess it is to be expected that sometimes we get to the stage where we feel that it is better if we don't volunteer next time round - it's time for me to live life a bit.

But what of those words of Jesus? This session is intended to be a reminder of the awesome privilege it is to enlist in the work of the gospel. It is also intended to remind us that while we may focus on the facts and figures that show how well our programme is running, God is far more interested in whether we truly love and trust him from the heart.
